THE HOARE GENEALOGY---

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Research given to Clara Hoar Doxney Caughey-  
Pittsburg, Pa.

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In the Recorder's Office in Lancaster Court House, Vol. N, Page 66,  
you will find the deed for .50 acres of land, recorded Feb. 2, 1700,  
owned by Robert Hoare and his wife Sarah Hoare. It is well worth  
seeing. Other information can be had, from one of the histories  
of Lancaster Co., written by Mr. Linville, by which you can trace  
your own line.

Our families came from England in 1723. The New England fam-  
ilies came over in the 1600's, about 1623 or about that time.  
Whether the families are nearly related or not, we cannot vouch.  
There is a tradition in the families, that some of those in Penna.  
went to visit the New England family.

My sister, Miss Laura Hoar, went to visit Senator Hoare (George Friable  
in Worcester, Mass., and he told her no one need be ashamed of the name,  
that in England they had held every office outside of Royalty.  
For many years there had been a bank in London run by the Hoares.  
He showed her books in which many distinguished men's pictures  
were of the Hoare family. He also showed her the family crest,  
or Coat of Arms, which was an escutcheon upon a silver shield,  
an eagle displayed with a double head-or two heads, within a  
bordure, enrailed blue. Crest-an eagle's head erased, in silver,  
a gold ring in its beak. Motto- 'Constanter'.

We do not know if we would be included in this or not-but it is  
borne by many families of the name, in the 'Shires' of England,  
and Ireland. This I got from a book sent me by Senator Hoare.  
He made many trips to England to find all he could about the

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Adam Hoar, father of Adam Byers Hoar, was stolen from England, and brought to America when he was six years old.

He was taken to Chester county, near Honey Brook, and raised by a Quaker family.

He afterwards lived on a farm-also owned a mill, one half mile from the Gap, in Lancaster County, Pa.

Some one has said the mill is now owned by Ed. Hertzler, near Churchtown, along the Conestoga Creek.

He owned a noted library, and was a man of great intelligence.

He married Elizabeth Linville, a first cousin of his and they had ten children.

Clement, Valina, and Elizabeth died under eighteen.

The HOARE-HOARE-HOAR Family in England.

According to George Frisbie Hoar, U.S. Senator, and historian,  
Hincokman  
the first emigrant of that name was Joanna Hoare, who died in  
Braintree, Mass, ten miles south of Boston, Sep. 21, 1651.

She was the widow of Charles Hoare, Sheriff of Gloucester, Eng.

She came to New England about 1640, with five children. (that eight.)

Joanna, Leonard, Daniel, John, Ruth, Margery, Charles and Thomas.

<sup>Lisle</sup>  
Bridget, widow of Leonard Hoare, first President of Harvard College, 1672

who was the first to drop the 'e' at the end of his name, died 1723.

They had one daughter Bridget Lisle, who married Thomas Cotton.

From Burke's Peerage, it seems two brothers-one James Hoare,  
stayed in England, and the other Abraham Hoare settled in Ireland.  
James was the father of James of the Tower of London, controller  
of the Mint, founder of Hoare's Bank, at the sign of the Golden  
Bottle at Cheapside, and banker to Oliver Cromwell.

Between the years 1700 and 1700 thirteen Members of Parliament  
from six different counties bore the name of Hoare.

Sir Richard Hoare of Kent, was Lord Mayor of London, in the mem-  
orable year of the Scottish Rebellion, 1745, and was knighted, Oct. 1755

His son was created a Baronet in 1766, and another son

William Hoare, of Bath, a portrait painter-formerly knighted,

who died in 1735. Sir Henry Ainslee Hoare, 5th Baronet of  
Somerset, and M.P. for Chelsea, 1863-1874.

Samuel Hoare removed from Cork to London in 1716, amassed a  
large fortune at 3 Freeland Road, Ealing, England.

His son Samuel Hoare, a banker of Hill, Barnett and Hoare, 1776.

Rev. Edward Hoare, Canon of Canterbury in 1812.

Hoare Family-the Senator was very proud of the name of Hoare.  
We came from adjoining shires in England, our family from  
Berkshire, and Senator Hoare from Gloucestershire. He said  
this crest is found to belong to many families of that name,  
in many shires, so we are as likely to own it as the others.

This is what is found in the history of Lancaster Co., and  
fearing you might not be able to get one, I have copied mine  
which came from a relative in Chester Co.,

Now, this is not very complete, but will give you enough to  
start on. I really did not think I had much information,  
and had forgotten where my papers were.
