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Henry C. Kuntz, Topeka, Kansas; Descendant from Abraham Kuntz, who emigrated from Germany to America, arrived at Philadelphia, December 8<sup>th</sup>, 1737, in the Ship, Robert & Alice, "Master Goodman, Captain," from Rotterdam last from Cowes, England, with 185 passengers, who were all Palatines.

He first settled in Berks County, near New Shillington, birth of Readings; by his first wife, had two sons, Christian and Jacob Kuntz; he purchased a farm for his oldest son Christian Kuntz, in Salisbury township, Lancaster County, one mile north east of Deganwachyterian Church. This son Christian, had three sons, John, Christian, and Jacob, John married Mary Schwalter, he lived and died on the farm in Salisbury township, for his sons, Christian and Jacob Kuntz, he purchased two farms, on the Peters road, in same township, from a one thousand acre tract of land first taken up by David Cewan, prior to 1729. The same was Deed to David Cewan, by William Penn; David Cewan had emigrated from England, with the Richardsons, Shiles, who had taken up large tracts, of land, East and West, adjoining. David Cewan, David Cewan died on the farm, which Christian Kuntz, had purchased, for his son Christian August 3<sup>d</sup> 1757, leaving a "Benevolent Will," a copy of same, with Inventory of his personal estate in my possession,) leaving the homestead to his son David Cewan, junior, from his heirs Christian Kuntz, purchased, prior to 1766. In the Inventory, of David Cewans personal estate 1757, is mentioned a "Wolf Trap" showing at that date wolves, were yet in that part of Lancaster County. This one acre tract, taken up by David Cewanson, is now divided, into eleven farms, also some smaller tracts.

Abraham Kuntz (in 1740) purchased for his second son, Jacob Kuntz, (by first wife) in Salisbury township, one mile south east of Deganwachyterian on this farm. The original Kuntz Burial ground is located, where Abraham Kuntz, (1740) with his two oldest sons, Christian, and Jacob Kuntz, with many of their descendants, are awaiting the "Resurrection Morning." Jacob Kuntz, had three sons, John, who married Mary Boley, (he was known as Boley, Johnie Kuntz, another son, John, died, Isaac, and Abraham, Kuntz, the latter was gentleman David Kuntz,) His sister Catharine Kuntz married John Kuntz son of John Kuntz and Mary Schwalter, (her sister Martha, was his second wife,) Three farms of the three brothers, were purchased from the Richardson Estate, William Richardson came from England, and settled, in Salisbury township, with David Cewan, He took up a large tract of land, which extended, from the old Philadelphia road, to the Welsh Mountain; William Richardson, died, at the Homestead, 1748, copy of his will in my possession) This farm is now known, as the Thomas McNeely farm. His son Isaac Richardson, died on the farm, 1768, (now owned by John E. Kuntz,) His son John Richardson, died on this farm, 1782, (his will, as well as his father, in my possession) He leaves his Gold shoe buckles, to his brother, William. The Richardsons, Cewans, and Shiles, belonged to the "Church of England," known now, as the "Episcopal Church," They organized "Saint Johns Church, Campasville, 1729."

In the year 1748, and after his first wifes death, Abraham Kuntz, crossed the ocean the second time, went to Germany, married Barbara Bollinger, arrived at Philadelphia, September 13<sup>th</sup> 1748. In the "Ship Phoenix," John Mason, Captain, with

This son of Henry Furtz & Barbara Geurty, was the ancestor of Samuel Furtz, Caly. Jason Geurty, Caly, whose mother, was a daughter of Christian Geurty, June 17 Henry Furtz, died, Oct. 21<sup>st</sup> 1826, whilst on a visit to his brother Abraham Furtz, who was married to Maria Geurty, sister of Henry Furtz's wife, Abraham Furtz lived on a farm on the Conestoga Creek, near Eden, east of Lancaster, Henry Furtz was first buried in a family burial ground on his brother's farm, several years ago. His remains were removed to Lancaster Cemetery, with others of his brother's family. Some of his descendants, yet living in Chester County are the Farnwicks, Hough, Thomas, and Mitchell, and others. The second son of Abraham Geurty by second wife, was John Geurty, married Barbara Garger, he settled on a farm in Perry County, North West of Harrisburg, Jacob Elenaker, who went to Perry County, 1789, settled in same neighbourhood. William Geurty Duggeley Jackson County Illinois claims descent from John Geurty, and Barbara Garger. The 4<sup>th</sup> child, by second marriage, 1749, was a son, Peter Geurty, married Esther Land.

Abraham Geurty, purchased a farm for this son, in Earl Township, on the Peters road, on the line of Earl & Leacock Township, which was owned in partnership with his youngest brother Samuel Geurty. This farm was first settled by Anthony Bretter, who died there March 1747. It was sold to Burfert who sold it to Abraham Geurty, prior to 1767, Anthony Bretter had 3 or acres in said tract, Leonard Elenaker, purchased the eastern part for his son, Anthony Elenaker, Peter Geurty, had one child, a daughter Hannah Geurty, who married John Binkley, John Binkley had one daughter, Mary Binkley, who at the age of 13 years, married Levi Farley.

The 5<sup>th</sup> child, of Abraham Geurty, by his second wife, was a son, Joseph Geurty who married, Fanny Miller, he lived and died near Reading. They had 18 children, his descendants became prominent as Physicians, Ministers, of the Gospel, and other walks in life. Abraham Geurty's 6<sup>th</sup> child, was a daughter, Maria Geurty, married, Abraham Furtz, he lived and died on a farm, on the Conestoga Creek, near Eden, east of Lancaster, his descendants, are to be found in Lancaster, Morrisburg, Lehigh, Merchant, Pennsylvania, whose father, was a grandson, Noah Furtz, and his brother, were killed by the "Kaufbecks", in Mississippi, after the Civil War. Many of his descendants, are yet of the "Irish Faith". The 7<sup>th</sup> child by second marriage, was David Geurty, married Barbara Land, he lived and died on a farm, between Sonnel Horse & Churchtown. Many of their descendants can be found, in Carrarann Township, Morgan County, and are of the "Irish Faith".

The 8<sup>th</sup> child of Abraham Geurty, 1740, by his second wife, Barbara Breninger, 1748, was Samuel Geurty, (who was his youngest son) he married Barbara Shewalter, he lived and died on the farm, in Earl Township, that was purchased for Peter Geurty, who with his brother Samuel, were joint owners of same, when at Peter Geurty's death, he became in possession, of the whole tract, It is the supposition, Abraham Geurty, died on this farm, Samuel Geurty's and Barbara Shewalter's family, all born in Earl Township,




